


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The how, why and what of an organization

Alberta Societies Act

Your Alberta Societies Act certificate of incorporation will be mailed to you after you successfully incorporate your society with the Alberta Corporate Registry.

To get a copy of your incorporation certificate, you can order it online. Visit the Alberta Corporate Registry's website and search for the society using its name or number.

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

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What are Objects? How do I find them?

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Objects **Ultra vires**

In corporate law, *ultra vires* describes acts attempted by a corporation that are beyond the scope of powers granted by the corporation's objects clause, articles of incorporation, or in a clause in its bylaws, in the laws authorizing a corporation's formation, or similar founding documents.

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A Charity under the Income Tax Act of Canada



An organization that wants to attain the special status of a registered charity under the Income Tax Act... must have purposes that are exclusively charitable and carry on activities that support those purposes.

Purposes (aka Objects): describe the aim or main intent of the organization.

Activities: describe how the organization will accomplish its purposes.




The term "charitable" is not defined in the Income Tax Act.

The courts have identified *four* categories of charity:


- Relief of Poverty
- Advancement of Education
- Advancement of Religion
- Certain other purposes that benefit the community in a way the courts have said is charitable

An **organization's purposes must fall within one or more of these categories** to be considered for registration as a charity.





Differences in Legislation

Example Amendment re: Members

Alberta Societies Act

Terms of admission of members and their rights and obligations; the conditions of withdrawal of members and the manner, if any, in which a member may be expelled.

Alberta Companies Act, Part 9


"Member" means a subscriber of the memorandum of a company and every other person who agrees to become a member of a company and whose name is entered in its register of members.

Canada Not-for-Profit Corporations Act

If there are two or more classes or groups, any voting rights attaching to each of those classes or groups.



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Policies




Why do charities and nonprofit organizations need policies? Procedures are one giant step towards minimizing risk!

Some examples of policies/procedures:

- Relating to the **roles within an organization:** creation or position description
- **Governance of organization:** *financial management*
- **Required by legislation:** Occupational Health & Safety
- **Specific to organization:** *youth volunteers*

Policies/procedures cannot contradict bylaws or legislation. Where do you find these documents? Where should they be stored?





Procedures

- Icing on the cake to complete the governance model
- Legislation and bylaw wording may be general concepts
- Policies are prescriptive but may lack details
- Procedures are step-by-step instructions on how to implement policies that were created pursuant to bylaws that were enacted pursuant to legislation.



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An Example for Nonprofits

Nominations for Board of Directors

- Bylaws might state that directors are elected at AGM
- Board creates a nominating committee pursuant to bylaws
- Nominations committee creates a nominations policy for approval by the Board
- Procedure to implement this policy created by step-by-step instructions or checklist created by the committee.



An Example for Charities

Gift Acceptance and Receipting

- The *Income Tax Act* has requirements for charities accepting and receipting gifts
- Each charity has different, needs, beliefs or capacity relating to gifts
- Board creates a gift acceptance policy
- Fund development committee/staff creates procedure to implement the policy and checklist for gifts presented to the charity with specific steps for each type of gift.



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Resources



- Plenty of resources to help create bylaws, policies and procedures
- Ensure the resource is relevant to the legislation and jurisdiction of incorporation
- Be mindful of copyright violations as the use of another's IP has a degree of legal risk and potential embarrassment.
